Kathryn Harrison is a Professor of Political Science at the University of British Columbia. She has a Bachelor's degree in engineering from the University of Western Ontario, Master's degrees in political science and chemical engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and a Ph.D. in political science from UBC. Before entering academia, she worked as a chemical engineer in the oil industry, and as a policy analyst for both Environment Canada and the United States Congress. Dr. Harrison is the author or editor of several volumes, the most recent of which is *Global Commons, Domestic Decisions: The Comparative Politics of Climate Change* (MIT Press, 2010, co-edited with Lisa Sundstrom), and has published widely on climate and environmental policy. Her awards include the KD Srivastava Award from UBC Press, Fulbright Fellowships, and a Killam Research Fellowship.

Richard Woodward is Senior Lecturer in Politics in the School of Politics, Philosophy and International Studies at the University of Hull, UK. His main research interests are in the field of political economy with particular reference to financial markets, the City of London, offshore financial centres, international organisations and the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). His first book *The Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development* (Routledge 2009) was the first single authored monograph to be written about the OECD for over 40 years. He has also published many journal articles and book chapters concerning the OECD's place in world politics including its relationship with international institutions and civil society organisations and its role in the international policy making process. Presently his work is focusing on the efforts by international organisations, especially the OECD, to elaborate an international regime to enhance tax transparency. His latest book, *International Organisations - A Companion* (co-authored with Michael Davies), will be published by Edward Elgar in April 2014.
